Visitor Centre Redevelopment underway

Redevelopment work on the Mair Street Visitor Information Centre and Museum has officially begun with a sod turning ceremony held last month.

The primary use of the redeveloped building will be for the Visitor Information Centre to have a permanent home to be shared with the Costume and Kelly Museum.

The redevelopment also brings a number of facilities to the CBD-side of Lake Benalla that the community has been asking for.

The redevelopment work includes public toilets for users of the splash park, while adding a number of secondary uses to the building including a cinema, café and exhibition space.

“Once completed, we will have a revitalised community space on the foreshore of our beautiful lake for both locals and visitors to enjoy,” Benalla Rural City Mayor, Cr Bernie Hearn said.

It is expected that the \$3 million redevelopment will take nine months, with the Visitor Information Centre relocating from its temporary home at the Commercial Hotel in Bridge Street.

Yarnbombers strike again

Colourful knitted creations are adorning bollards and pergolas across the central business district, as part of the Benalla Yarnbombers' winter installation.

Community volunteers have been knitting and crocheting a range of colourful decorative ornaments to brighten up our rural city and beautify public spaces.

The installation will be in place until 3 September.



Bridge Street pergolas get a facelift

Work to improve the Bridge Street pergolas is underway as Council continues to deliver projects using funding received under the Victorian Government's Outdoor Activation Fund.

Timber screening surrounding the pergolas has been installed and tables and seating inside the fenced area will go in soon. High tables and stools will also be installed under the pergolas over the coming weeks.

“Benalla's main street isn't the only area Council is improving with this funding. We have already installed pod seating around Lake Benalla and have delivered new picnic seating to Swanpool, Goorambat and Devenish townships,” Benalla Rural City Mayor, Cr Bernie Hearn said.

“People might have also noticed the new lighting in the pergolas and laneway from Bridge Street to Denny Street carpark, which was also funded by the State Government as part of this COVID recovery initiative.”

Benalla Rural City Council received \$300,000 from the state government's \$40 million Outdoor Activation Fund.
