PURPOSE OF REPORT

The report presents funding applications under the 2022/23 Community Sponsorship Program.

BACKGROUND

The Community Sponsorship Program enables local community groups, clubs and organisations to seek funding to increase their capacity to work in partnership with the Council and others to address local needs and enhance the local community.

The Community Sponsorship Program distributes grants up to \$500 on a monthly basis, allowing local clubs, groups and organisations the opportunity to seek funds when the need arises.

FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS

The 2022/23 Budget allocates \$15,000 to the Community Sponsorship. To date, \$2,500 in Community Sponsorship grant funding has been allocated.

To ensure transparency and accountability, where assistance is provided in meeting the cost of Council facility hire, the payment is reflected in relevant ledger accounts via an internal transaction.

For example, if the Council agrees to meet the hire cost of the Benalla Town Hall a credit would be made to the Town Hall income ledger account and a debit made to the Community Support Program expense ledger account.

In addition, recipients of support throughout the financial year are detailed in the Annual Report.

2. Goulburn Broken Regional Catchment Strategy

PURPOSE OF REPORT

The report seeks the Council's support of the Goulburn Broken Catchment Management Authority's *Goulburn Broken Regional Catchment Strategy 2021-27*.

BACKGROUND

The Goulburn Broken Catchment Management Authority (GBCMA) develops a Goulburn Broken Regional Catchment Strategy every six years.

The Goulburn Broken Regional Catchment Strategy 2021-27 (the Strategy) is an overarching document that outlines the long-term vision for the integrated catchment management and is guided by the Catchment and Land Protection Act 1994.

The strategy guides actions to improve and protect the Goulburn-Broken catchment's land, water, biodiversity and community.

A summary of the strategy is attached as **Appendix 1**.

Five key principles will guide the implementation of the strategy:

- 1. Strengthen partnerships between community, landholders and agencies
- 2. Community-led: community leaders are involved in decision making and priority actions align with community values.
- 3. Embed resilience principles to respond to uncertain futures and knowledge; and anticipating and adapting to change.
- 4. Supported by science: priority actions address critical tipping points, and improve knowledge and understanding
- 5. Foster stewardship: priority actions build values of environmental stewardship among the community, landholders and organisations.

DISCUSSION

For the Strategy to be successful and to improve the health and resilience of the catchment area, collaboration and support is needed from groups and organisations that live, work, visit and invest in the Goulburn Broken catchment.

The GBCMA is seeking a pledge of support from the Council. Pledges of support will feature on the GBCMA's website.

Providing a pledge of support will underpin the 'Support the Goulburn Broken Catchment Management Authority Regional Catchment Strategy and other regional environmental strategies' in the Council Plan 2021-2025.

In return for the Council's pledge of support, it will receive annual updates on catchment condition and progress towards the strategic outcomes. The Council will also be notified of collaboration opportunities to share perspectives, influence decisions, design and/or deliver catchment-wide projects.

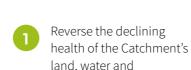
